
This document is intended for the participants SSDC 2025 (Phase 1 -Online Selections). The document goes over the debate format, speaker roles, and judging rubric for this phase.

\*Please note that the in-person competition will have a different format and judging criteria.

## SSDC Phase 1 (Online Video Submission) Speaker Roles/Guideline:

## Affirmative (PRO) Side:

#### Constructive Speech (4-minute speech)

- 1. Introduction: Should be rhetorically persuasive and introduce the topic seamlessly.
- 2. Key Definitions: Select the correct key words in the topic and define them clearly for the debaters and judges.
- 3. Burdens of Proof: Explain what your team must prove to win the debate.
- 4. Signpost: Clearly list the 2–3 core arguments you will present ("Today I will present three arguments. First, ......, Second , ......, and Third, ......").
- 5. Argument Analysis (Main Points): Follow the Claim-Reason-Evidence-Impact (CREI) structure (details provided in other training resource documents) to ensure clear execution.
- 6. Conclusion: End your speech with a clear call to action.

## Answer Speech (4-minute speech)

- 1. Introduction: Be rhetorically persuasive and highlight the main point of PRO side.
- 2. Identify & acknowledge each question asked by Con Side.
- *3.* Answer each question effectively: Provide direct responses while re-enforcing the constructive speaker's points

4. Conclusion: End your speech explaining why PRO side wins the debate despite the questions of the CON side.

## Synthesis Speech (4-minute speech)

\*Speaker SHOULD NOT introduce new material like arguments, examples, or evidence. Speaker CAN add new layers of rebuttals.

- 1. Introduction: Refocus the debate by reminding judges of your team's goal and why the key stakes favor the proposition.
- 2. Identify Clashes (major points of disagreement between the two teams): Clearly name the 2–3 biggest points of conflict (e.g. "Clash 1: Economic Growth vs. Social Cost"; "Clash 2: Security vs. Privacy").
- 3. Clash Format (for each Clash)
  - a. Pro Side: Summarize in 2-3 sentences what your team argued on this point.
  - b. Con Side: Summarize in 2-3 sentences how the opposition responded.
  - c. Weigh & Decide: Explain extensively why your side's impact or logic is stronger & more important.
- 4. Conclusion: Issue a concise, compelling statement urging judges to vote for your team because you've won the clashes.

# Negative (CON) Side:

Question Speech (2-minute speech)

- 1. Introduction: Start with a punchy statement that frames your role as uncovering gaps and demanding clarity.
- 2. Questions (2 to 3): Clearly state the question in one or two sentences and explain the importance of each question as you go. Questions should be about gaps in definitions, evidence issues, unclear assumptions, logical fallacies etc.
- 3. Conclusion: End by reminding judges that unanswered or flawed answers expose the proposition's case as fundamentally unsound.

Rebuttal Speech (4-minute speech):

- 1. Introduction: Open with a sharp, persuasive claim exposing the biggest flaw in the proposition's case.
- 2. Signpost Main Rebuttals: Clearly list the 2–3 core points you will dismantle ("Today I will rebut their claims on A, B, and C.").
- 3. Rebuttals: Please follow this format
  - a. They Said: "They argued X."
  - b. They Are Wrong Because: "X fails due to Y (detailed explanation of flawed evidence/logic)."
  - c. Therefore: "Your risk/impact Z shows their point collapses."
- 4. Conclusion: Sum up why the proposition's case fails and urge judges to reject the motion now.

### SSDC Phase 1 Judging Rubric/Score Breakdown:

- 1. Constructive
  - a. Content (56 pts) Case Setup, Argument Development, Evidence Use, etc.
  - b. Organization (28 pts) Overall Speech Structure, Argument Structure (CREI)
  - c. Role Fulfilment (8 pts) Execution of necessary steps stated as per speaker role guidelines.
  - d. Time Compliance (8pts) Spoken for the full length of allocated time.
- 2. Question
  - a. Quality of Questions (30 pts): Questions are effective and are probing into core parts of the debate.
  - b. Questions Structure (10 pts): Questions are clearly stated and then importance of the question is explained.
  - c. Relevance to the topic (5 pts): Questions are relevant to the debate and its points.
  - d. Prioritization of Questions (5pts): Questions are asked based on the order of importance it holds in the debate.
- 3. Answer
  - a. Acknowledgment of Questions (10 pts): All questions are addressed.
  - b. Answer Quality (10 pts): Answers are to the point & conclusive.
  - c. Re-affirmation (15 pts): Speaker reminds the judge of the constructive points when/where appropriate.
  - d. Conclusive Remarks (5 pts): Re-focuses the debate on the main considerations.
- 4. Rebuttal
  - a. Engagement (45pts) Rebuttal Quality
  - b. Organization (30 pts) Overall Speech Structure, Rebuttal Structure
  - c. Role Fulfilment (20 pts) Execution of necessary steps stated as per speaker role guidelines.
  - d. Time Utilization (5 pts) Spoken for the full length of allocated time.
- 5. Synthesis
  - a. Debate Synthesis (40 pts): Overall summary of the debate (both pro and con side points ) packaged in different clashes.
  - b. Comparative Weighing (25 pts): Explanation of why their impacts are more important than the opponent's impacts.
  - c. Organization (25 pts): Overall Speech Structure, Clash Structure
  - d. Role Fulfilment (10 Pts): Execution of necessary steps stated as per speaker role guidelines.
  - e. Time Utilization (5 Pts): Spoken for the full length of allocated time
